CHRs are great advocates, in part, because they come from the communities they serve and have tribal cultural competence. Their dedicated work has assisted many to meet their healthcare needs. The health promotion and disease prevention efforts that CHRs provide have also helped people from the community improve and maintain their health. By providing health education and reducing hospital readmissions, CHRs have contributed to lowering mortality rates. The demand for CHRs continues to grow.

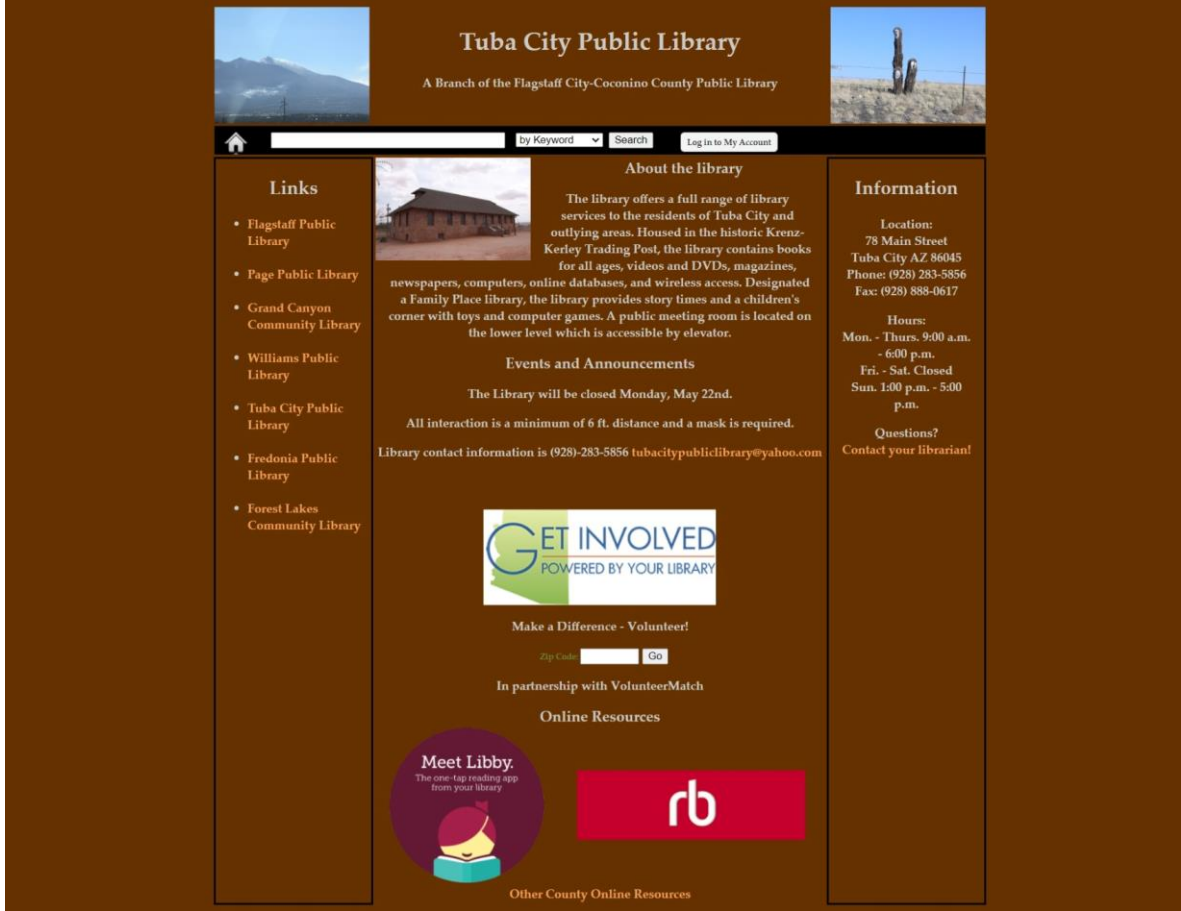
Innovative Telehealth Projects with Native Americans

Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation

"ABAJA" - "THE PEOPLE"

The We-Ko-Pa Casino Resort is located on the grounds of the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation. This nation descends from the first 10 central Arizona Yavapai tribes and encompasses Maricopa rim area for thousands of years. Today, Yavapai nation covers 28,000 acres in Maricopa County, which adds to the 1.2 million acres the tribe also owned in central Arizona and portions of 400 acres with reservation was established for the Yavapai in 1853 and 800 of the tribe's more than 300 members now call the reservation home. Yavapai nation strives to preserve its traditions and values, all while keeping up with its members' changing needs in our evolving society.

The Fort McDowell Yavapai, the "Abaja" - "The people" are one of three Yavapai tribes in Arizona. The Yavapai are among the Yavapai speaking groups, which also include the Maricopa, Neotoma, Acumpeya, the Pinal, Gila, and other Yavapai tribes. The people have lived and worked in central Arizona for thousands of years.

FORT MCDOWELL YAVAPAI NATION

About Our History

ORIME DAM

In the early 1970s, construction of the Orime Dam was proposed at the confluence of the Verde and Salt rivers, a short distance from the reservation's southern border. The project would have flooded the reservation and forced the Yavapai to leave when removal of its reservoir finished.

With limited financial resources, individuals from the community spearheaded an aggressive campaign that called the support of fellow tribal members. Other Indian tribes and non-Indian groups also opposed the dam.

In September 1979, the community members voted 144 to 17 against selling their land to the federal government for the dam. One in November 12, 1981, after consulting with the Fort McDowell Tribal Council and the Governor's Advisory Committee, Justice Secretary James West announced that Orime Dam would not be built. Both were a vital first step and led to the construction of the dam.

THE FIGHT FOR GAMING RIGHTS

During the early 1990s several tribal casinos, including *Fort McDowell*, operated in Arizona. In accordance with the provisions of the federal 1988 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, the tribes were working to negotiate compacts with the state government. However, at the time the state Governor opposed Indian gaming and called upon the U.S. Attorney's Office for support.

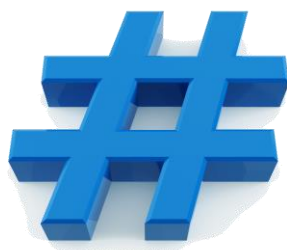
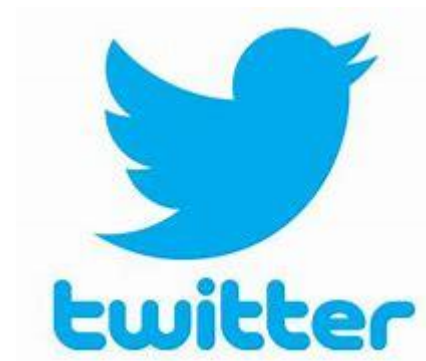
Comments made by FBI agents on the Indian casinos were included in court files on May 12, 1992, again to block the Fort McDowell Casino using the community's 100 gaming members. Gaming then left several tracks. Community members lobbying for red bank gambling action. They called other community members, tribal leaders and the state media.

Using every available tool, and given off-by members, a blockade of the casino road was organized. Violence occurred, including a three-truck standoff between the tribe and government. The Arizona Governor was ultimately persuaded to sign a gaming compact with the tribe, thus giving the way for Indian gaming in Arizona. They did it with a tribal holiday.

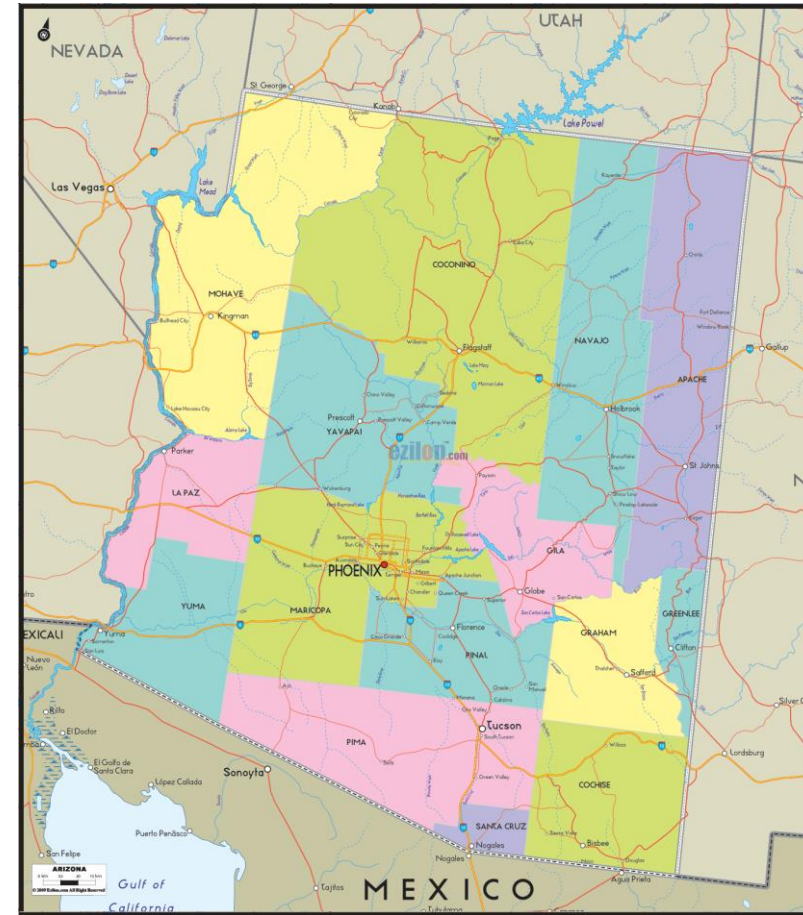
